THE SCREENSHOT

At **2:13 AM**, a man opens his apartment security-camera app after hearing something move outside his bedroom.

2:13:07 AM.

2:13:09 AM.

Looking at his phone.

Not toward the camera.

Toward the phone.

The screen suddenly changes.

The security-camera feed disappears.

His phone displays the screenshot he just took.

Except the image has changed.

Now there are **two versions of him** standing in the bedroom.

One is holding the phone.

The other is standing directly behind him.

And the second version is looking straight out of the screenshot.

As if it knows he is watching.
